

### "We are going to know a new freedom and a new happiness..."

ever in a million years would I have believed I'd have to go to prison for that promise to come true. But I did... and it did. For 18 years prior to my arrest, conviction, and incarceration I'd been in and out of AA. At one time I'd strung together over nine years of continuous abstinence, and at the time

I'd strung together over nine years of continuous abstinence, and at the time called it sobriety. The next nine years were periods of a few months of abstinence and meetings followed by periods of "self will run riot". In the course of those last nine years, I managed to ruin a career, two marriages and many friendships, and lose my material possessions, my home, my trustworthiness, and finally my freedom — such as it was.

Finally, totally defeated and sufficiently humbled, I was "right sized" to be teachable. Having had AA in my past, I knew about personal inventories so while in County Hail, waiting to go to prison, I did one. I realized I had nothing left. I had nothing left to lose but my life itself. Everything was gone; but my memories. I then remembered something I'd heard in AA that Abraham Lincoln is supposed to have said: "Many times I've gone to my knees in prayer simply because I had no where else to go". So I did the same. Soon a peace came over me and I remembered something else I'd heard. That was: "When God is the only thing you have left, you find that God is enough". With that awareness I finally, for the first time, really understood the first three steps and owned them at the bottom of my heart.

One of the things prison gives a convict is time. Plenty of time. This has afforded me the opportunity to do a 4th step at a depth I had heretofore not imagined possible. I have been able to "plumb the depths" and really get down to causes and conditions. The outcome was ego deflating and further helped in getting me "right sized". It turns out I'm no different than the alcoholics described in the Big Book: "selfishness, self-centeredness. That, (I saw) was the root of all (my) troubles."

When I arrived at Airway Heights I started going to meetings. At first I sat and listened. I'm a bit older than most of the other prisoners and in my "magical, magnifying mind" I thought none of them would want to hear anything I had to say. Besides, how could I trust myself to be honest? Hadn't I been here before and thrown it all away? In time I realized I'd not been here before. The first time through, I was learning the language. I was "talking the talk" so well I couldn't see or hear that I was not "walking the walk". Now there is o payoff for being good at AA. The only reward is recovery. The only payoff in here for "practicing these principles in all our affairs" is the serenity and peace that comes as a result thereof.

And all the promises of Chapter 6 have come true. I came to AA to find answers and make a new start. In AA I found God and though I'm in prison, I know "a new freedom and a new happiness" better than anything I've felt before. And I'm deeply grateful that God loved me so much that, even though I'd given up on Him, He kept trying to get my attention until He let me put myself in a place where I was forced to slow down and listen enough to heard His message of love, forgiveness and hope. For that I am grateful to be an alcoholic and a prisoner. The "payoff" is really worth what it took me to get it. —"Big Bill"

ello Fellow Travelers: This past month is a mixed bag. On one hand I have had such great receptions where I have gone for Delegate's reports and other events in the Districts in the Area. I have traveled a few thousand miles since I got back from the Conference. What a great experience it has been to crisscross the area giving reports and participating in our miracle of life. And then last week I sent out an announcement via email to the Area Committee, that one of the hard working staff members at GSO had finally succumbed to his fight with cancer. Bill Archer who some of you knew from his visits to our Area and from phone conversations as he changed positions at GSO. The first time I met Bill was when he was here in Area 92 as part of the contingent from GSO for our Special Forum, he was Public Information Staff at the time and answered some pointed questions from members of our Area. Bill was this years Conference Coordinator and only a few knew I guess just how Ill he was. We heard that he had re-entered the hospital shortly after the conference. Some of us saw him at PRAASA this past year in Irvine as the Saturday night speaker. Bill's family and his friends at GSO and in the fellowship are in our prayers. We received word at the conference that the beloved Robert Smith Jr. (Smitty) had passed away. This is old news but many of us remember Bob Jr. as speakers at AA and Alanon events all over the country. We have now said goodbye

to the last of the family members who were there. Should you still want to send a card please call me for the details. I will not put his wife's address in the newsletter. Thanks to all the Districts that are sending me the District highlights and newsletters, believe me I do read them so don't stop.

I want to thank Dave the Alternate Delegate who has traveled with me to most of the reports and it has been really nice to have the company on some of the longer trips as we listen to AA tapes and trudge this road. I think he could probably give the report for me now. My wife Patsy even had a few words at one of the reports about her experiences at meetings in New York where she was so graciously attended to by the members of the New York Intergroup.

As I mentioned in my report each week we get the correspondence from GSO and this past month is no different. We received the Advisory Actions and additional Considerations which I sent to the Area Committee to be shared with the Districts. The final reports will be out probably in September.

By the time you read this you are probably on your way to the PNC which as you might recall was voted on by the Area to continue to support. Our support because of that vote will mean that if we don't support it one way by participating we will in another by paying the bills should there be a shortfall. I have been told that we are currently behind in registrations from what

was anticipated since it is such a great experience and there has been so much work done by the committee to promote the conference. But who knows we are notoriously late for things and maybe everyone is waiting to register at the door. See you there. Next is the Pacific Regional Forum in Portland, what a great way to get to meet and know the Staff, and General Service Board representatives of your General Service office, and the Grapevine Office.

There is a Vacancy for an Non Trustee Director of AA Grapevine Board in 2005. The Board of Trustees has requested that the AA Grapevine Board's recommendation for this position be presented to the Trustees' nominating committee for review at its January 2005 meeting. Since resumes need ot be screened and applicants interviewed by members of our Corporate Board in a timely fashion, the process must begin well in advance. They plan to review resumes in early September in order to schedule interviews during the autumn. Completed Resumes are to be submitted by August 13, 2004. There are 5 considerations to qualify for filling the vacancy.

### A Tale of Two Hats

s Alt-Delegate for WSEA 92 I have two jobs. One is to be prepared to step in for the Delegate if needed plus assist the Delegate in his duties. In order to be prepared and ready to take over for Mike if need be he and I spend a lot of time communicating. We are on the phone several times a week plus we travel together to various events. This gives us a chance to talk about the conference and other events that

affect AA as a whole. In fact we spend a good deal of time talking about AA as whole. Mike and I have worked together for several years in the service of Area 92. This makes communication a natural thing for us. The General Service Office keeps the group records in a date base called Delegate Area. We have a new program this year that is an Access Program. We use this program to exchange information with

GSO. I get the group information changes from the DCM or the groups and make the changes in Del-Area. When I feel I have all the latest updates made I export the data to a floppy disk and send it back to New York. They import it to their database and send me an updated disk, which I then import into our Area Data Base.

We have another database in the Area. It is for the Newsletter

Editor and is on an Excel spreadsheet. Phil and I are working to keep this updated. I am making updates right now to the Excel spreadsheet to make sure it has the latest changes that I have made to the Del-Area. I am crossing checking the two databases and will get the information back to Phil M. our Newsletter Editor. Phil has been working hard to have an accurate mailing list for the Newsletter. It is a big job and our information is only as good as we are able to get it from the groups and the districts. I feel that

most of the districts have done a very good job of getting the information to us. We are just six months into this Panel and most of the hard work is done as far as group records. I am still learning how to do the Registrar job and expect to have it figured out about two days before I rotate. in the AA program

• Availability to attend all quarterly and planning meetings of the AA Grapevine (a total of up to eight per year), quarterly meetings of trustees' to which Corporate Board Directors are appointed, and the General Service Conference for on week each year. Additionally, directors may be called upon to attend interim subcommittee or other meetings and, occasionally, to represent AA Grapevine at Regional Forums or other AA functions.

Delegates must have rotated a minimum of one year before applying for this position. Therefore, Panel 53 Delegates will not be eligible for consideration for this opening.

Now for the last bit of information as you all know the General Service Office AAWS has raised the price of the literature to the price prior to the sale of the 4<sup>th</sup> edition. This is in response to a drop in the prudent reserve enough to warrant the increase. I am asking all the registered groups in the Area to begin to become self-supporting in regards to the General Service office. Each year a registered group has cost linked to the communication and participation in general service that amount to approximately \$42.00 per year or about \$3.50 per month per group. But at least if a group sent what would be enough to pay for just the GSR packet \$1.25 per month. Currently 13% of the groups in Area 92 are contributing to GSO, down from 18% in 2003. I hope that what we can do is not take from the District or the Area to make this happen but find the additional funds to maybe send a small donation each month to GSO. If you might wonder where that money goes a good explanation will during sharing at the regional forum. It is our opportunity to help insure that AA is available to anyone who has a drinking problem, anywhere, anytime. See you at PNC. We are so truly blessed.

# From Where I Sit...

BC (District 1). Summer has arrived with our sunshine finally! As promised I am devoting this month's article to getting ready for the 2005 International Convention. I'm basically condensing the website information in this article. The International convention website has been updated this month. To see it in its entirety please go to http://www.alcoholics-anonymous.org/default/en\_services\_aa.cfm?pageid=39

For those that don't have access to a computer don't despair!!

World Services will be mailing out information to your homegroup's GSR in late August or September. Since next year's Convention is going to be in Toronto there are some issues that need to be addressed if you wish to cross the border.

Ideally US citizens should have a passport for proof of citizenship, however, an original or certified copy of your birth certificate and photo ID is acceptable. (As a Canadian coming into the States I usually just bring my birth certificate and phone ID) Residents of the US that are not US citizens must have a green card. Depending on what country other members are from, a visa may be required.

It is suggested that anyone with drunk driving or felony convictions in their past might inhibit their attendance to the Convention seek assistance. One way is contact the Canadian Consulate in Seattle to see if he or she is admissible to Canada or to ask what can be done to become eligible. Canada considers all DUI's/DWI's as felonies. A 2001 law allows most people with one DUI/DWI occurring 10 years ago or more to been deemed eligible for admission to Canada. However, it's best to check with a Canadian con-

sulate or embassy office; even some lesser convictions may prevent members from entering Canada. It's important to check.

Here are some guidelines that were provided by a senior official of Citizenship and Immigration Canada:

Application for approval of rehabilitation must be made to the nearest visa office as far in advance of the event as possible since procession will likely take several months. Forms are available on the Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) website www.cic.gc.ca (to get forms and applications, see the blue box under "Help" at the top of the first page after the language selection page. Note: there are fees for processing application forms.

Applicants should write "CONVEN-TION 2005"

TION 2005" prominently in the upper right hand corner of the application in order to allow identification since applications of this nature are not normally processed on a priority basis.

Applications must be completed fully and accurately and all supporting documentation must be attached to minimize delays in processing. No guarantees can be given but visa offices will do everything possible to process applications in advance of the event if they are properly identified and properly completed. #### **Treatment**

and requested that the Singleness of Purpose Statement currently used in six CPC pamphlets be included in the Treatment Facilities Workbook and that the Fall/Winter 2002 and Fall 2003 issues of About AA be included in the Treatment Facilities Kit.

The committee requested that the A.A.W.S. Board review the price of the Treatment Facilities Kit.

The committee discussed Treatment Facilities area and district committee service work at homeless shelters, halfway houses, outpatient treatment programs, and nursing homes. Committee sharing indicated that in some areas Special Needs or Cooperation With the Professional Community Committees contact nursing home personnel; in other areas, Treatment Facilities Committees perform this valuable service work.

The committee discussed Bridging the Gap activities, which also reflected a wide range of experience. The committee discovered that in some areas the Treatment Facilities Committee and Correctional Facilities Committee do their own Bridging the Gap work and in other areas a separate Bridging the Gap committee has this responsibility.

The committee requested that the Treatment Facilities staff person request further shared experience on the scope of Treatment Facilities Committee activities from areas, districts, and intergroups/central offices in the U.S. and Canada.

The committee discussed ways of carrying A.A's message of singleness of purpose, which includes mailing letters and making visits to treatment facilities professionals, and conducting workshops for A.A. members and professionals on what A.A. is and is not.


