8:00 a.m. Call to order by Area 92 Chair, Debbie T. It was followed by a moment of silence and the serenity prayer, reading of the 12 Traditions and 12 Concepts in both English and Spanish. Debbie reminded the body who is eligible to vote. Debbie asked for approval to record proceedings D6 and D2 second. Approved. District 22 made a motion to accept the minutes of the October Assembly and it was seconded by District 12. Approved. Debbie welcomed new GRS and gave an overview of what will happen today. Debbie reminded the body to speak clearly and slowly into the microphone because we are recording the proceeding.

Agenda Items Review

Allen D is on the Grapevine Committee and Archives Committee at the GSC so we reviewed the Grapevine section of GSC agenda Review 1st. Allen thanked Gary P for putting together the GSC agenda items Archive PowerPoint. Allen covered the Grapevine and Archives GSC Agenda items with a fair amount of participation.

We stopped discussion on Agenda items at 1100 for GSR sharing as per our Handbook, then resumed the Agenda item discussions after lunch.

(After lunch) Debbie introduced past Delegates Dave McM and Scott R

Dave announced that Allen D, current Delegate is celebrating 13 years of sobriety today and presented a coin to him at the podium. Allen said a few words about recovery and service being a pleasure, sharing his experience, strength and hope.

All agenda items were presented and discussed into the afternoon.

Allen discussed the other nominees and that he reviewed their resumes. It is going to be amazing! Allen said that what we all do is good for A.A. as a whole. I have my own business license and have one client. I also dreamt of working for the schools as a Para Educator. In order to do that though, I had to take a test. This program taught me how to overcome my fear and take that test. I'm happy to report I passed with flying colors! I was able to attend PRAASA and experience plane de-icing for the first time in my life. I met with other Area Chairs from the Pacific Region and once again, got to learn I am not alone – I am not the only one who is scared to death standing up here and we shared some ways to help each other. I also attended the Standing Committee Workshop and participated in some great discussions. I have been helping with the planning of District 6 & 20 service workshop. I am grateful to be of service to Area 92. Debbie T.

Alternate Chair-Diana M

Diana, one of the Triple D's, shared on attending PRAASA and celebrated 35 years sobriety on 4/3/18.
