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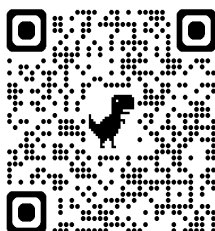

Leadership in A.A.: Ever a Vital Need (Excerpts from Bill W.'s article in the April 1959 Grapevine. See Concept IX, page C29 of "Twelve Concepts for World Service" for the full article).

Somewhere in our literature there is a statement to this effect: "Our leaders do not drive by mandate: they lead by example." In effect, we are saying to them, "Act for us, but don't boss us...." Therefore, a leader in A.A. service is a man (or woman) who can personally put principles, plans, and policies into such dedicated and effective action that the rest of us want to back him up and help him with his job. When a leader power-drives us badly, we rebel; but when he too meekly becomes an order-taker and he exercises no judgment of his own — well, he really isn't a leader at all.... Good leadership originates plans, policies, and ideas for the improvement of our Fellowship and its services. But in new and important matters, it will nevertheless consult widely before taking decisions and actions. Good leadership will also remember that a fine plan or idea can come from anybody, anywhere. Consequently, good leadership will often discard its own cherished plans for others that are better, and it will give credit to the source.... Good leadership never passes the buck. Once assured that it has, or can obtain, sufficient general backing, it freely takes decisions and puts them into action forthwith, provided, of course, that such action be within the framework of its defined authority and responsibility....

Another qualification for leadership is give-and-take, the ability to compromise cheerfully whenever a proper compromise can cause a situation to progress in what appears to be the right direction. Compromise comes hard to us all-or-nothing drunks. Nevertheless, we must never lose sight of the fact that progress is nearly always characterized by a series of improving compromises. We cannot, however, compromise always. Now and then, it is truly necessary to stick flat-footed to one's conviction about an issue until it is settled. These are situations for keen timing and careful discrimination as to which course to take.... Leadership is often called upon to face heavy and sometimes long-continued criticism. This is an acid test. There are always the constructive critics, our friends indeed. We ought never fail to give them a careful hearing. We should be willing to let them modify our opinions or change them completely. Often, too, we shall have to disagree and then stand fast without losing their friendship.

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This is an exciting month as we prepare for our October Election Assembly and we get ready to elect our next Panel 76 Delegate and Area Trusted Servants! We will have our Pacific Region Trustee, Riley K., here to facilitate our Third Legacy Procedure for the elections and we will also have Area 72 Delegate, Courtney and another representative from Area 72 in attendance to help with the counting of the paper ballots and tallying of combined votes (online/in person).

If you are thinking about making yourself available for an elected position or an appointed position I hope you have read our Area Handbook for the Job Description and the Service Manual. It may also be helpful to reach out to one of the current electeds or appointeds about what the job really does involve, there are a lot of duties that are required but not completely detailed or updated, as of yet, and that you also take the time to talk to your family about what the position may require. You will be given an opportunity to share your service resume verbally in front of the whole body, (Elected). If you are going to submit a

resume for an appointed position, you will submit your service resume to the Newly Elected Chair, the deadline for submissions is October 31st. I am really excited for our Area and for what the future holds for us

all.

This last month I finished up with all my report backs, attended the Colville Roundup and just this last weekend facilitated a group inventory for Road to Recovery in Spokane.

Just a reminder, it's never too early to schedule a GSR School in your Districts for all the new GSR's for the next rotation, Please note for all new DCM's and GSR's the Orientation Packets can be found on our Area website, area92aa.org, under the resources tab.

I am hoping to have the Final Conference Reports for you all at the October Assembly, however I just heard they won't be shipping until mid October, fingers crossed they arrive before I hit the road for Spokane! They are available in digital format on aa.org. I also jumped on the zoom call for the 85 years of AA in Washington planning meeting, this really sounds to me like something our Area Archives Chair and Archivist should be involved with, however we are looking at getting a quote for a possible neutral location for both Areas.. Don't forget there will be an 85 year birthday celebration for AA in the State of Washington next year on April 19. My understanding of the plan is to have a main location in person with a virtual component but that hybrid and virtual meetings will also be included in several other locations. Lisa and I recently attended the virtual planning meeting for this along with some of the A72 (Western WA) peeps and they are seeking a facility for about 1,000 people. There are at least 4 other locations in A72 planning on having the smaller meetings concurrently, and my hope is that we can add a few others with that capability in A92 as well. There might even be an opportunity to offer a location for the bigger meeting.

Because there was an event bid offered in the Tacoma area that was fairly expensive and they were seeking alternatives I mentioned the Three Rivers Convention Center in Kennewick as we are already in negotiations with them for a potential National Corrections Conference there in November of 2027. It is a new and exceptional venue and our own Mike T from the National Corrections Conference (NCC) bid committee will contact them as he is already our front man in the corrections bid. However Lisa also has also independently done some footwork for the Wenatchee area which would be a more convenient and central location but it sounds like about 650 is the largest facility there. Stay tuned as this is a developing story and more will be happening. Hit me or Lisa up to attend the future planning meetings. But we are coming up on an election assembly and many, including myself, are focused on our upcoming election this month in Spokane.

I recently got back from the "Roundup of Recovery" in Colville with many Area faces including Yakima's own Shawna L as a speaker. This coming Saturday October 4 I will be at Washington State Penitentiary and shortly after will be packing a bag for our upcoming election assembly. Just a couple weeks after it's off to Nashville with a crew from both A92 and A72 to represent and bid for a National Corrections Conference (NCC) in Tri-Cities November 2027. I must not like to sit still, LOL I very much am hoping to win this bid as the NCC event is designed to be a big shot in the arm for local corrections volunteerism and we are always in need of more people.

Speaking of shots in the arm, we now have an ad-hoc committee for the purpose of establishing our own Young People in AA (YPAA) standing committee here in A92. There was representation and presentations by our YPAA at the recent standing committee workshop in Wenatchee and expect to hear more about this at the Election Assembly. Progress.

The latest on the meeting start up at Eastern State Hospital is that we are waiting to get enough volunteers cleared to start regular ongoing in-person meetings there. My understanding is that a few of the residents have actually attended (and probably still are attending) some of our other virtual meetings that are available. So still trying to get that off the ground and we are either close or they are already happening. As with most institutional meetings the wheels turn slowly

but momentum is gained with persistence and effort. Great job and thank you to Dave W and to that committee and volunteers.

That's all I can think of for now. Hope to see many of you in Spokane in a couple weeks.

Keys to Corrections

A Column to Inform and Encourage

Welcome to our seventh installment of what we hope to be a long running column of informative, encouraging, and inspirational topics from the wonderful world of service in AA Corrections. We welcome you to the... **Keys to Corrections!**

This month we are continuing to look at how we as an AA Area and its Districts support its regions Prisons. The first thing that should be known is that A.A.W.S Corrections Workbook addresses the inherent differences between how we as the Hand of AA reach into a Prison vs a Jail or Juvenile facility.

“Although the basics of carrying AA’s message into youth detention centers and short-term facilities are no different than carrying the message into any other Correctional Facility, many Area Corrections Committees felt there was an expressed need to include some information in this workbook regarding what they viewed as added challenges to service work in these two areas and, based on their experiences, some suggestions on leading meetings in these institutions.

Experience shows that there is often a rapid turnover of individuals in both youth detention centers and short-term facilities. Frequently, attendance at AA meetings in these institutions may not be voluntary. It is prudent to be aware that, like many AA members in the beginning, some people may not believe they have a problem with alcohol and resent attending an AA meeting. It is important to remember that AA is there to offer a message of hope. You may not be able to see immediate results, but a seed may be planted.”

So, what does this mean, and why highlight it? Stemming from the single factor of length of stay, or as the Workbook termed it *“rapid turnover of individuals.”* Historically we have experienced a much greater willingness with our Prisons wanting us to have meetings behind their walls, than our Jails or Juvenile facilities. Not that we do not have some where meetings are taken in, but the numbers speak for themselves.

100% of our Area 92 Prisons have meetings, whereas only a fraction of our Jails and Juvenile centers welcomes us in with meetings. Their residents simply are not there long enough. So, we support in different ways, often heavily relying on our message of Hope being carried by our literature.

Our level of involvement and activities in our Prisons though are starkly different. They well could be held up as pinnacle examples of AA’s effectiveness at carrying its Message in the corrections arena. Here in Area 92, this has been the case for decades, long before we were even Area 92. In fact, we have the unique and distinct claim to having our Walla Walla Pioneer Group be the second registered AA group meeting ever behind the walls, founded only weeks after San Quinten. And it is also the longest continuous running correctional facility group in the world.

So, what goes on with AA in our Area 92 Prisons? We have five Prisons: Airway Heights next door to Spokane WA, Coyote Ridge in Connell WA, ICIO in Orofino ID, NICI in Cottonwood ID, and WSP in Walla Walla WA. All five of our Prisons have impressive levels of involvement, so we shall fairly take them one at a time, in alphabetical order. This edition we will spotlight and look at what goes on in our Coyote Ridge Corrections Center (CRCC) in Connell, Wa.

Our District 4’s Coyote Ridge, is located roughly 40 miles directly north of Washington’s Tri-Cities and about 100 miles SW of Spokane, Wa. CRCC is a minimum, medium, and long-term minimum facility. Opened in 1992 with an expansion in 2009, it currently has a capacity of 2530 and is our Area 92’s 2nd largest prison.
