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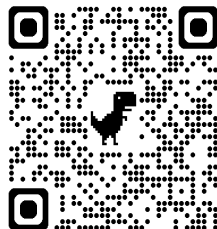

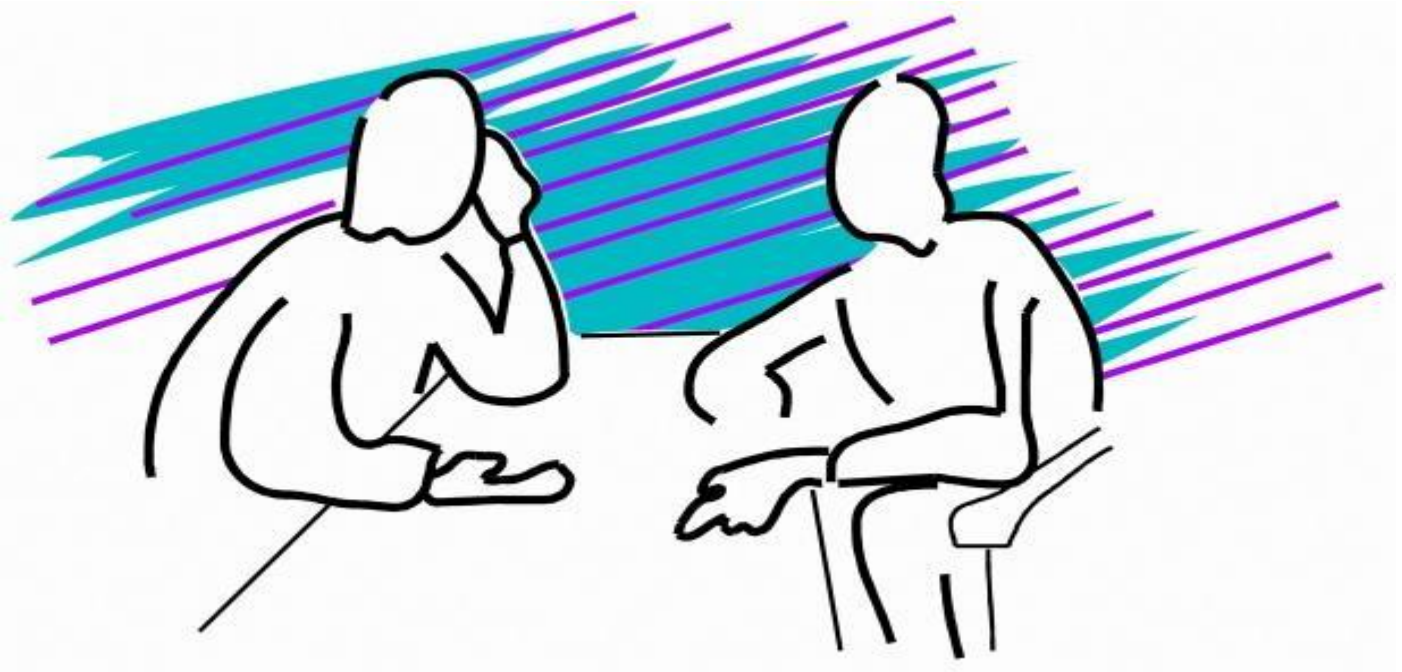
Thank you Area 92 for attending and participating in the October Assembly in Spokane. I am so excited to serve in Panel 76. Area 92 is the best...

I'm Mike, an alcoholic and the newly appointed Area 92, Panel 76 Corrections Chair.

I started with corrections in my early sobriety back in 1983 at our local jails. I began taking meetings into the Washington State Penitentiary in the mid-90's. I was volunteered by an old-timer named Don O. from Pasco, WA. Don and I went for many years to the workshops and then in August 2001 we became once a month red-badged volunteers. Don went until he couldn't go anymore due to his health issues.

One memorable occasion I remember was a cold snowy December Saturday just before Christmas. I went to the pen by myself and only one inmate showed up for the Pioneer group meeting. I'll keep the story vague to protect his anonymity. He was in his 60's and had another 85 years to go on his sentence. It was just him and me in the chapel and he told me his 5th step. I drove away knowing my higher power had sent me there that day for that purpose.

I told my sponsor Kenny S. that I was going in by myself and he instantly said, "I'll go with you!" Ken was always into big book study groups and with the support of our home group; several of us began twice a month big book studies at the penitentiary. The guys inside ran the meetings, sponsored other inmates and paid for the coffee. They'd walk the yard and do their steps. My sponsor Kenny passed away late last year, but he left a legacy behind.

The inmates can't hold a meeting unless an outside sponsor attends. I strongly encourage anyone wanting to help those behind bars to volunteer. The outside sponsor doesn't need experience behind bars; they need experience in staying sober!

Greetings Area 92 Newsletter Readers! My name is Jim and I am an alcoholic. It is an honor and a privilege to have been selected to serve as the Technology Chair for Area 92 Panel 76. Here's a brief recap of how God has worked in my life and how we've gotten to this point.

I got sober in Western Washington Area 72 on June 27th, 2005. It wasn't the first time I'd quit drinking, or even the first time I'd gone to AA, but something different happened and for that I am eternally grateful. This time I followed all of the suggestions - I found a wonderful home group, got an amazing sponsor, went through the book *Alcoholics Anonymous* from the title page to page 164, and followed the instructions to the best of my ability. As a result, the obsession to drink was lifted and I found that I could be useful - something that I didn't think was possible.

My foray into general service began when I became the Alternate GSR of my home group at around 4 years sober. Three months after I began that position, our GSR "went back out" right before the Area 72 Assembly. I got to attend that assembly with only a quick trip through the AA Service Manual with my sponsor as my experience. What an eye opening event that was! I was able to attend several more Assemblies, both as a GSR and also as the Grapevine and Literature representative for my district. During that time, I was able to go back through the Service Manual with a much better idea of what being part of General Service really meant. After that, an opportunity arose to be of service outside of Alcoholics Anonymous and I actively pursued that for several years. I still kept up regular AA meeting attendance and always had a service position at my home group.

In 2019, my wife and I got the opportunity to move to Clarkston, WA. After a crazy first year getting settled in our new home, I reached out to my local District 7 DCM, Rich G., right as Covid hit. There was a very sparse District 7 webpage with an old incorrect schedule and nobody seemed to know who was hosting or running the site. I suggested that District 7 consider adding a Web Servant position to create a current website and the next thing you know, I'd been elected to that newly created position. At the end of that rotation, I made myself available for other district service and was elected Alternate DCM for Panel 72 and then DCM for Panel 74.

While attending the January 2022 Finance Committee pre-conference agenda review meeting, the then Alternate Treasurer Fran L. learned that I had a background in computers and suggested I check out the Area 92 Web Committee. That was January of 2022 and I've been an active member of the Web/Technology Committee ever since that first meeting. During my time on the Technology Committee Meeting, I've spent time serving as the primary contact for Area 92 Google Workspace items, committee Secretary, and most recently committee Co-Chair.

All of that brings us to today. I've had the opportunity to work with some amazing people on the Technology Committee, including our past Chairs Bryan B., Dan M., and Dave G. I'm excited to help continue to build on the solid foundation of work that they have created. Both our in-person and hybrid online events have gotten better every year and I hope that the Panel 76 Technology Committee can continue that tradition. Thank you for the opportunity to be of service!

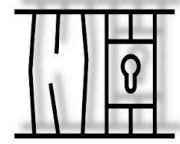

Keys to Corrections



A Column to Inform and Encourage

Welcome to our eighth installment of what we hope to be a long running column of informative, encouraging, and inspirational topics from the wonderful world of service in AA Corrections. We welcome you to the... **Keys to Corrections!**

This month we are continuing to look at how we as an AA Area and its Districts support its regions Prisons. The first thing that should be known is that A.A.W.S Corrections Workbook addresses the inherent differences between how we as the Hand of AA reach into a Prison vs a Jail or Juvenile facility.

“Although the basics of carrying AA’s message into youth detention centers and short-term facilities are no different than carrying the message into any other Correctional Facility, many Area Corrections Committees felt there was an expressed need to include some information in this workbook regarding what they viewed as added challenges to service work in these two areas and, based on their experiences, some suggestions on leading meetings in these institutions.

Experience shows that there is often a rapid turnover of individuals in both youth detention centers and short-term facilities. Frequently, attendance at AA meetings in these institutions may not be voluntary. It is prudent to be aware that, like many AA members in the beginning, some people may not believe they have a problem with alcohol and resent attending an AA meeting. It is important to remember that AA is there to offer a message of hope. You may not be able to see immediate results, but a seed may be planted.”

So, what does this mean, and why highlight it? Stemming from the single factor of length of stay, or as the Workbook termed it *“rapid turnover of individuals.”* Historically we have experienced a much greater willingness with our Prisons wanting us to have meetings behind their walls, than our Jails or Juvenile facilities. Not that we do not have some where meetings are taken in, but the numbers speak for themselves.

100% of our Area 92 Prisons have meetings, whereas only a fraction of our Jails and Juvenile centers welcomes us in with meetings. Their residents simply are not there long enough. So, we support in different ways, often heavily relying on our message of Hope being carried by our literature.

Our level of involvement and activities in our Prisons though are starkly different. They well could be held up as pinnacle examples of AA’s effectiveness at carrying its Message in the corrections arena. Here in Area 92, this has been the case for decades, long before we were even Area 92. In fact, we have the unique and distinct claim to having our Walla Walla Pioneer Group be the second registered AA group meeting ever behind the walls, founded only weeks after San Quinten. And it is also the longest continuous running correctional facility group in the world.

So, what goes on with AA in our Area 92 Prisons? We have five Prisons: Airway Heights next door to Spokane WA, Coyote Ridge in Connell WA, ICIO in Orofino ID, NICI in Cottonwood ID, and WSP in Walla Walla WA. All five of our Prisons have impressive levels of involvement, so we shall fairly take them one at a time, in alphabetical order. This edition we will spotlight and look at what goes on in our Idaho Correctional Institution-Orofino (ICIO) in Orofino, ID.

Orofino Idaho is located roughly 145 miles east of Walla Walla, WA and about 145 miles SE of Spokane, WA as well. ICIO or “Orofino” as you may hear it referred, resides in our District 7, which has the distinct claim as our only District with two Prisons within its territory. Fortunate for Orofino and District 7’s other Prison, Cottonwood, this District has for years and years been strong supporters with a high level of

responsible outreach with their Hand of AA in supporting their correctional facilities. Not only does our District 7 have a successive history of a District Corrections Chair, but they have a District level Corrections Committee established to consistently serve their facilities.

The ICIO website opens with this description of our Cottonwood facility:

“Idaho Correctional Institution-Orofino was originally a state school and mental health facility. A new wing was added in 1988. ICIO is designed to house up to 580 male residents. The facility primarily houses medium-custody residents but also houses protective-custody residents. Givens Hall, a unit adjacent to the compound, serves as a work camp. ICIO offers vocational work programs, education and other programming opportunities.”

580 residents housed makes Orofino District 7’s largest Prison, and Area 92’s fourth largest Prison.

GSO’s records list Orofino’s first registered meeting as the “Men in Recovery Group” activated in 2011, which has a recently reported attendance of nearly two dozen. District 7’s Corrections Chair also reports there is a second smaller meeting currently occurring at Orofino now.

Literature support to Orofino primarily comes from individuals and Groups within District 7 through their Pink Can efforts. Area 92 supports with a couple Grapevine subscriptions and any request for Big Books, 12 x 12’s, or Daily Reflections and such. Area 92 also supports by disseminating any fliers and needs for Volunteers to help carry the message into their meetings.

One important thing to remember when it comes to meetings in facilities, there is an extremely important relationship that must be established and maintained between the correctional professional who oversees community involvement (Community Partnership Program Coordinator or CPPC) and the primary AA Member, usually the Volunteer Coordinator. Often this relationship will last for years when nurtured.

However, if the facilities CPPC person feels AA is not need or wanted, then we do not get in, nor sometimes even get literature in. As District Corrections Chairs, these are the persons they serve. AA Volunteers and their Coordinator do not have “rotations” or “terms”, they have *passion*, and most have been doing this AA work for many years. As Area and Districts, we do not govern, manage, or have any authority over these activities, we support them in their efforts. If you would be interested in being one of these persons with *passion* and help support the Cottonwood facility, please reach out and contact District 7’s Corrections Chair to get the process started, or myself at the Area 92 level. It is Service you won’t regret!

This edition we will spotlight and look at what goes on in our Coyote Ridge Corrections Center (CRCC) in Connell, Wa.

Our District 4’s Coyote Ridge, is located roughly 40 miles directly north of Washington’s Tri-Cities and about 100 miles SW of Spokane, Wa. CRCC is a minimum, medium, and long-term minimum facility. Opened in 1992 with an expansion in 2009, it currently has a capacity of 2530 and is our Area 92’s 2nd largest prison.

We as AA have a long history of supporting the CRCC facility. Currently it is holding several meetings; *There Is a Solution Group*, *Dr. Paul O. Step Study*, *Un nuevo Día*, *Un Día A la Vez en el Campo*, and it's oldest *Stepping Out Group* registered May 2nd of 1994. That's just two years after the facility opened. As you can see, CRCC has two Latino/Spanish speaking meetings. These are new as of the summer of 2025.

Over the course of Area 92's Panel 74, extensive effort of key Members within our Latino Districts successfully gained clearance and built tenor enough to gain a foot in the door sufficient to get these meetings up and running. NY has listed, a previous Spanish speaking meeting at CRCC, *Grupo Azteca* registered June 6th of 1996, but it shows that in April of 2010, it went inactive. All our meetings behind the walls rely heavily on our Volunteers to consistently be involved. And if you have a calling to Service within Corrections and are one of our Spanish speaking Members, Latino or not, you can double your impact at helping the hand of AA keeping these more challenging meetings to support, stay in existence.

CRCC is very approachable with it's Community Partnership Program Coordinators (CPPC), we of AA have responsibly maintained very positive relations with Staff and our inside Members. The CPPC and our AA Volunteer Coordinator is an absolutely critical bond that enables us in, and this has been a healthy relationship with AA and CRCC for three decades. The facilities efforts on their end can be seen in things such as a consistent Newsletter addressing activities, actions and efforts with its partnered programs, such as us, distributed several times throughout the year. Also, annual and semi-annual recognitions, open-houses, and workshops are initiated and held by the facility. In the past we have had AA Members honorably mentioned and even receive Volunteer of the Year recognition. Not all facilities are as responsive as CRCC in welcoming outside programs to work with them, and we appreciate the long-standing positive and effective relationship AA has been able to have with them.

When it comes to AA's side of the relationship, we have shown up consistently over the years with our own organized workshops, and speaker meetings events. These take much effort on both sides as "one-time" passes/clearances, and event notifications are often needed. Its takes hard work putting on events like this on the outside, you can only imagine the efforts it takes to pull one off on the inside!

Literature wise, AA shows up to CRCC in several ways. At the above mentioned inside events, the need for literature during these is high, and its needs are met often at the District and Area level. At CRCC this need has usually been heavily supplied in a self-supporting way by District 4 itself. Recent events have only requested a portion of its needs be met by Area 92's Corrections Committee help. But thanks to your Area Pink Can Program, and 7th Traditions support, we have been able to do so. Area also provides several Grapevine and La Vina subscriptions. Other ways Area has a hand within the CRCC facility is through actively encouraging AA programs such as the Bridge/Reentry/Prerelease and Corrections Correspondence (CCP) programs, creating and dispersing Volunteer needed flyers, and maintaining a working relationship with its District 4 Corrections Chair.

It would be remiss to not acknowledge a long-standing direct support to CRCC by the Tri-Cities Intergroup and its Bookstore. Their involvement and supporting hand have been firm and reliant for some time. It takes many avenues of support to maintain a healthy relationship with a correctional facility, and Area 92 humbly appreciates your works.

Correction's AA Volunteers and their Coordinators do not have "rotations" or "terms", they have *passion*, and most have been doing this AA work for many years. As Area and Districts, we do not govern, manage, or have any authority over these activities, we support them in their efforts. 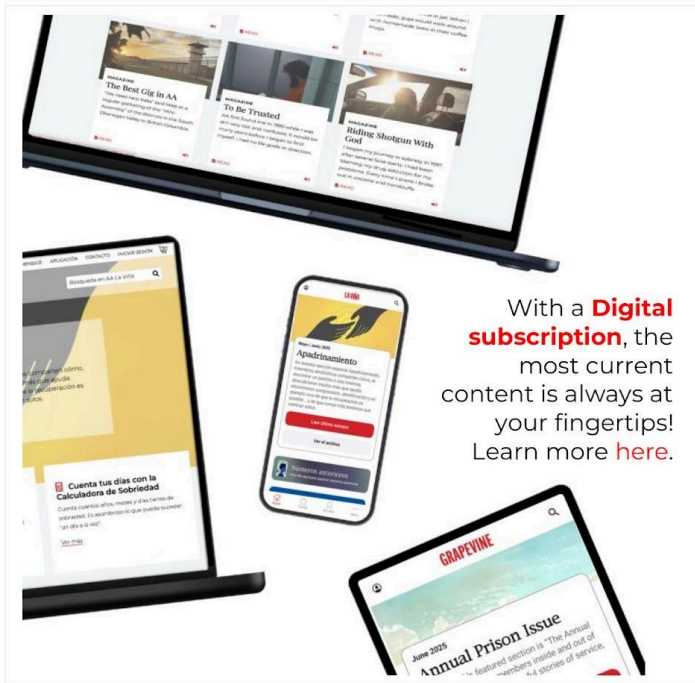

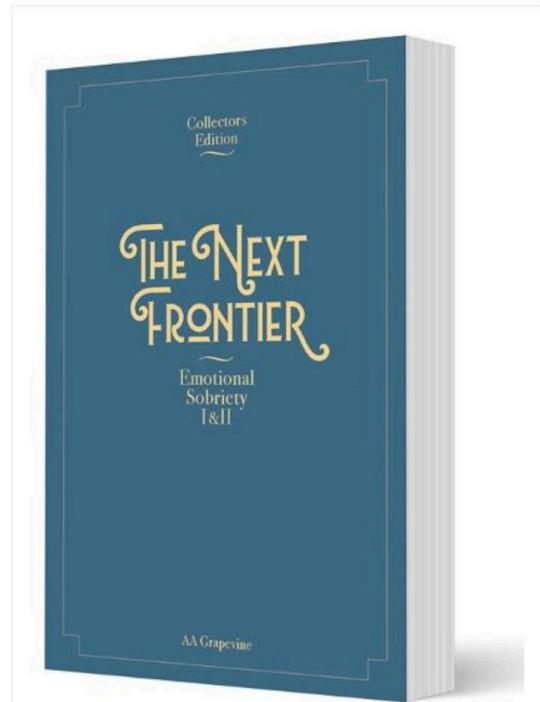

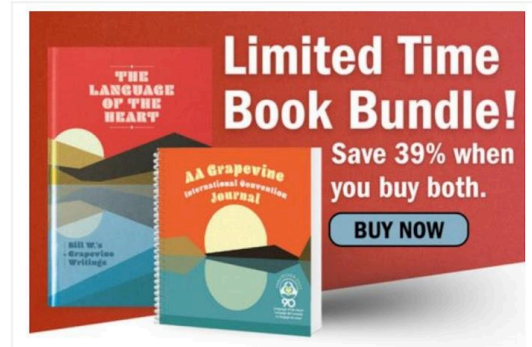
