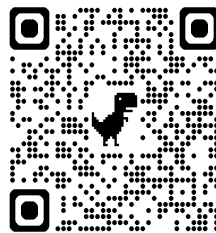

Reaching Out & Defining Success for Panel 76

I recently had the privilege of attending an outstanding presentation regarding AA's relationship with the legal community. The conversation, featuring Class A Trustee Judge Kerry Meyer and ABA Commission on Lawyers Assistance Program Chair Yvette Hourigan, Esq., was an eye-opener. It highlighted a critical need: we must ensure our message reaches legal professionals through direct, person-to-person contact - carrying the solution only we can provide.

This focus on *active outreach* brings me to our upcoming rotation. As we step into Panel 76, how will we measure our success?

For my own upcoming position, I define success by many metrics but will initially focus on these two: the depth of our Area's engagement in vital 12th Step work, and how well-informed we are regarding the General Service Conference agenda.

I invite all incoming Committee Chairs to adopt a similar mindset. Let's move beyond checking boxes and measure our effectiveness by the **concrete actions** we take to help the still-suffering alcoholic. Here is a vision of what that success might look like:

- **Public Information (PI):** Tracking the active rotation of Public Service Announcements in local media.
- **Cooperation with the Professional Community (CPC):** Counting the number of professionals (doctors, clergy, lawyers) who receive person-to-person contact.
- **Archives:** Ensuring our history is protected while actively using it to provide background support for new motions.
- **Grapevine/Literature:** Measuring success through new subscriptions sold and the distribution of new literature.
- **Technology:** Evaluating how effectively our technology tools facilitate the actual work of the Area.
- **Corrections & Treatment:** Focusing on the number of facilities with active meetings and one-on-one volunteer contact.
- **Translation/Accessibility:** Ensuring interpretation is available for all communications and that every barrier to entry is addressed.
- **Newsletter:** Ensuring that our communications tool is effective and efficient.

We have significant work ahead. However, I am fully confident that our Panel 76 volunteers, with the help of the Fellowship and our Higher Power, are more than equal to the task.

Corrections

Hello Area 92!!

Well, it is finally here, time for me to draft my last Area 92 Newsletter submission to you as your Area Corrections Chair. So very bitter-sweet. And I like a little sea salt in my bitter sweet chocolates, so I am going to say "salty" too!! Because in this final chapter of our Panel 74 rotation, I can say for myself and many of my Panel 74 members, we laughed, cried, loved, and toiled during our works. I guess you could say we invested blood (occasional paper cuts), sweat, and tears into our positions.

Don't miss this month's "*Keys to Corrections*" column. It is the final installment of our Area 92 Prison focus. Check out how we support our District 9's Washington State Penitentiary (WSP). Flip through this issue for your "*Keys to Corrections - A Column to Inform and Encourage*". During this rotation we have processed 41 Bridge/Reentry requests from Members inside the walls stepping out and back into society and our Fellowship. Dig back to your July & August 2024 issues of the Area 92 Newsletter and read their

"Keys to Corrections" columns to get a sense of what this activity looks and feels like for our inside Members, and outside Volunteers. 10 of those requested successfully made it to their first meetings with the help of their Volunteer. 14 were MIA, and 9 are unknown. That is a 25% success rate, but more importantly, 10 persons started on a path of Recovery that can not help but have a positive ripple effect we cannot even calculate. And 8 more of those 41 are still pending release, most within the next 2-3 months. So, that percentage rate could climb significantly higher. Good work everyone.

Much work was accomplished during this rotation, and I think the evidence in that is reflected by the large number of resumes' which came in for selection to the upcoming Panel 76 positions. Thinking about it, I cannot help but draw a conclusion that we as Panel 74 reached and touched you, our Area 92 Fellowship, with a purpose and effectiveness that was sufficient enough for some of you to step out of your comfort zones and make yourselves available to carry on the necessary works of the AA Service Structure in our Area 92. I thank you, whether elected or appointed or simply made yourself available, you proved there is a purposeful heartbeat of AA that is alive and well in WSEA92. I wish Panel 76 the greatest of success.

Our Panel 74 journey started in Spokane, December of 2023, and is ending back here in Spokane next weekend at our passing of the torch Standing Committee Workshop on the 13th. In-between these two dates were travels (in order) to; Wenatchee, Yakima (back-to-back), Tri-Cities, Spokane, Libby MT, Coeur d'Alene ID, Spokane, Selah, Yakima, Libby MT, Walla Walla, Ellensburg, Wenatchee, and back-to-back in Spokane again. In all regions of our Area were formed Friendships that can only be found within the Service Structure of AA.

From early in my Sobriety these types of relationships have been forming, and we only seem to find ourselves back in contact while doing this type of work, making them a unique facet of my Recovery. I remember my first Assembly in Area 72 at barely a year sober, sitting at a table in Ocean Shores in a room with 850-900 other GSR's. That marathon weekend began my relations in the structure of Service. The next year at the Assembly, I again ran into some of those new found friendships as we marveled at our continued sobriety and the things we had learned of AA during our year apart. Fifteen years later, I still run into a handful of these cherished persons when I am out and about in my Service commitments. It's that kind of special that makes my Service relationships a unique facet.

As I was able to serve Area 92, you, the Fellowship, Individuals, Groups, GSR's, DCM's, our Latino community, and especially the District Corrections Chairs, Corrections Committee and the facility Volunteers that make it all happen in AA Corrections, let me just say, what an absolute honor. I cannot even begin to articulate the impressions and respect you have filled my heart with. You have all raised the bar of my already formed opinion that Alcoholics Anonymous is made up of the finest of God's children on the planet.

At this Area level position as your Corrections Chair, I have been part of a panel of persons who will forevermore be a marker in time for me. Like a season on a sports team, we together all made the plays on the court of AA as a unified body. My heart has been touched with the experiences and memories that will continue to go with me. I thank you; Michelle, Bryan, Fran, Lorri, Dan, Jacqueline, Ricky, Colton, Jennifer,

Dave, Virginia, Carole, Eddie, and particularly for herding us along, our Lady Delegate, Lisa. I treasure you all.

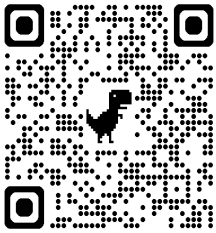

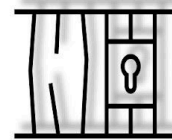

Keys to Corrections



A Column to Inform and Encourage

Welcome to our ninth installment of what we hope will be a long-running column of informative, encouraging, and inspiring topics from the wonderful world of service in AA correctional facilities.

Welcome to the... **Keys to Corrections!**

This month we continue to look at how we, as an AA Area and its Districts, support the prisons in your regions. The first thing to know is that the A.A.W.S Correctional Workbook addresses the inherent differences between how we, as the Hand of AA, get into a prison versus a jail or juvenile facility.

“Although the basics of carrying AA’s message into youth detention centers and short-term facilities are no different than carrying the message into any other Correctional Facility, many Area Corrections Committees felt there was an expressed need to include some information in this workbook regarding what they viewed as added challenges to service work in these two areas and, based on their experiences, some suggestions on leading meetings in these institutions.

Experience shows that there is often a rapid turnover of individuals in both youth detention centers and short-term facilities. Frequently, attendance at AA meetings in these institutions may not be voluntary. It is prudent to be aware that, like many AA members in the beginning, some people may not believe they have a problem with alcohol and resent attending an AA meeting. It is important to remember that AA is there to offer a message of hope. You may not be able to see immediate results, but a seed may be planted.”

So, what does this mean, and why highlight it? Stemming from the single factor of length of stay, or as the Workbook termed it *“rapid turnover of individuals.”* Historically we have experienced a much greater willingness with our Prisons wanting us to have meetings behind their walls, than our Jails or Juvenile facilities. Not that we do not have some where meetings are taken in, but the numbers speak for themselves.

100% of our Area 92 Prisons have meetings, whereas only a fraction of our Jails and Juvenile centers welcomes us in with meetings. Their residents simply are not there long enough. So, we support in different ways, often heavily relying on our message of Hope being carried by our literature.

Our level of involvement and activities in our Prisons though are starkly different. They well could be held up as pinnacle examples of AA’s effectiveness at carrying its Message in the corrections arena. Here in Area 92, this has been the case for decades, long before we were even Area 92. In fact, we have the unique and distinct claim to having our Walla Walla Pioneer Group be the second registered AA group meeting ever behind the walls, founded only weeks after San Quinten. And it is also the longest continuous running correctional facility group in the world.

So, what goes on with AA in our Area 92 prisons? We have five prisons: Airway Heights next door to Spokane WA, Coyote Ridge in Connell WA, ICIO in Orofino ID, NICI in Cottonwood ID, and WSP in Walla Walla WA. Our five prisons have impressive levels of participation, so we’ll take them one at a time, in alphabetical order. In this edition we will highlight and see what happens with AA at our Washington State Penitentiary in Walla Walla, WA.

Walla Walla is located approximately 158 miles south of Spokane, WA. Washington State Penitentiary (WSP) or “Walla Walla,” as you may hear it called, resides in our District 9.

The Washington State DOC website begins with this community description of our Washington State Penitentiary facility:

"Community volunteers provide programs and services that promote positive reintegration into the community, including religious programs, Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) and Narcotics Anonymous meetings, assisting Veterans with military issues, assisting inmate's families with children mentoring programs, and special programs (i.e., dental hygienist, photographer, etc.) that are available to the inmate population and their families.

Additionally, guest sport teams, choirs, musical groups, guest speakers/lecturers, and professional groups have held programs for the inmate population. There are also groups that assist inmates in the process of re-integrating back into society."

Opened in 1886 and now listed at housing 2,489 persons within its Maximum, Close, Medium & Minimum custody levels, WSP is our Area 92's largest correctional facility. And at 2468 Coyote Ridge is pulling a close second.

In April of 1942, when AA was just 7 years old, warden Clinton Duffy of San Quentin called the Alcoholic Foundation, likely Bill Wilson himself to say,

"If Alcoholics Anonymous can save just one man I want to start it here"

Later that year in September 1942, five prisoners at Washington State Penitentiary held an AA meeting in the *Big Yard*. Their names were Earl C, Roy A, Earl H, George L, and Barney B. They called their group *The Hilltoppers*, perhaps because the prison is situated on a hill. Shortly afterward the name changed and became *The Pioneer Group*. This is the oldest continuous running AA group anywhere in the world, meeting inside the walls of a correctional facility. They just had their 83rd anniversary, September of 2025.

Sometime in the spring of 2025 our District 4 Corrections Chair, Mike T., came across a unique publication on ebay titled "*Pioneer*". It happened to be the "Volume 7 Number 3 September 1957" issue. This would suggest it had been running since 1950, just eight years after the groups founding. Within its opening page it reads:

"Published quarterly by the Pioneer AA Group, Washington State Penitentiary, Walla Walla. All expenses of publication and the circulation of the Pioneer is derived from the Inmates Welfare Fund."

Talk about *self-supporting*!! The bottom of the front cover has a most reflective quote printed; "*The present is but a razor's edge between our future and our past!*" Meditate on that one for a minute!! It is not known how long this publication ran, but what a 30-page gem this is within our archives. For a sample reading, check out the June 2025 edition of our Area 92 Newsletter.

Currently the WSP facility has AA support reaching in from far outside of it's District 9 borders. Recent District Corrections Chair reports state the following:

WSP/EAST (Camp)- AA Meetings Saturdays 12:00-1:30pm (Pioneer Group) 2:30-3:30pm
WSP/South (Medium). Meetings covered: 1st Saturday by Yakima, 2nd Saturday by Richland, 3rd Saturday by Walla Walla, 4th Saturday by Pasco/Burbank, 5th Saturday by Yakima. Meetings are consistent, led by those inside and sponsorship inside is occurring.

Also, efforts currently are underway at WSP to establish a Spanish speaking meeting by some of our same members who initiated the recent one now meeting at our Coyote Ridge facility. Do you speak Spanish?!?! Get involved! Reach out through the emails at the end of this column. Way to go Volunteers!!

Literature support for WSP comes from several avenues by Individuals, Groups, Districts, and Area 92 through their direct and Pink Can efforts. Area 92 supports with Grapevine subscriptions and any requests for Big Books, 12 x 12 or Daily Reflections and so on. Area 92 also supports by disseminating flyers for volunteer needs to help bring the message to their meetings. WSP is active with workshop and speaker events during the year which rely heavily on volunteer and outside support.

One important thing to remember when it comes to on-site meetings, there is an extremely important relationship that needs to be established and maintained between the correctional professional who oversees community engagement (Community Partnership Program Coordinator or CPPC) and the core AA member, usually the Volunteer Coordinator. Often, this relationship will last for years when nurtured.

However, if the facilities CPPC person feels AA is not need or wanted, then we do not get in, nor sometimes even get literature in. As District Corrections Chairs, these are the persons they serve. AA Volunteers and their Coordinator do not have “rotations” or “terms”, they have *passion*, and most have been doing this AA work for many years. As Area and Districts, we do not govern, manage, or have any authority over these activities, we support them in their efforts. If you would be interested in being one of these persons with *passion* and help support the Washington State Penitentiary facility, please reach out and contact District 9 or Area 92’s Corrections Chair to get the process started. It is Service you won’t regret!

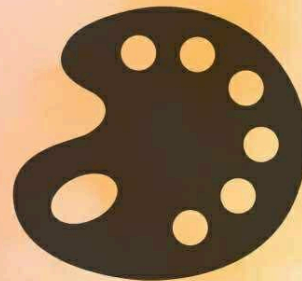
