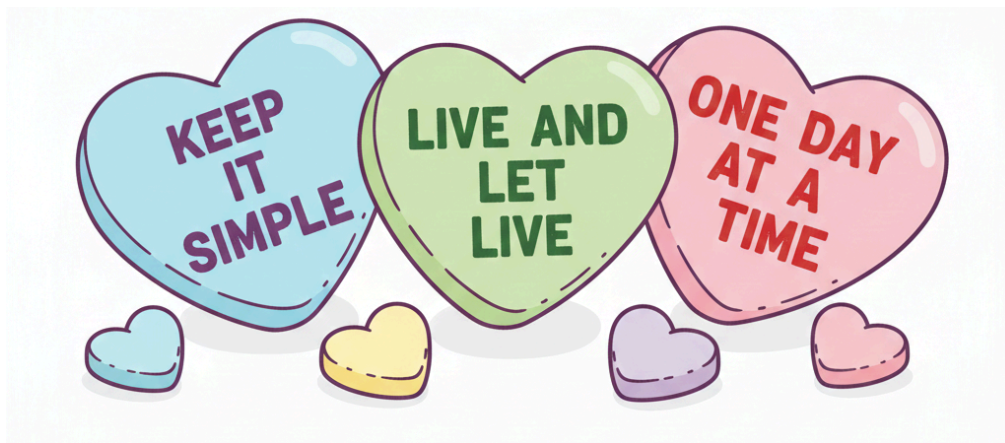

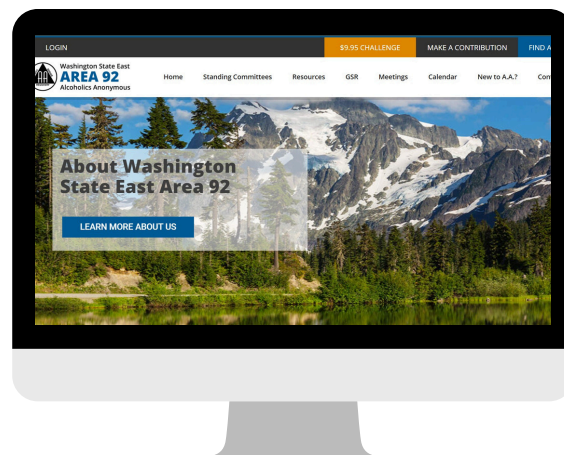

Area Inventory

Hello Area 92,

As most of you know, we will be doing our area inventory at the October Assembly. In response to our 2022 Inventory, a couple of the Recommendations made were:

1. “Start earlier in the Year”

2. “Select a diverse set of committee members by the Spring Assembly”.

The Inventory Committee will sort the questions, combining any that have the similar theme and then come up with 3-5 questions we will use to conduct the Inventory. We would like to be able to get the questions out to the groups and districts no later than the July 2026 Quarterly, to give everyone the opportunity to review and discuss in your groups and districts so that we may have a really awesome discussion during the inventory.

Remember this is your area and basically your inventory, so we need your help with questions and we are still in need of 1-2 more members to help on the inventory committee. Below I have listed the Questions from a couple of our past inventories.

October 2018

- 2) Are the Standing Committee Workshops a productive and cost effective way to do committee work or would we be better served by doing our committee work at the Area Assemblies and Area Quarterlies?

October 2022

- 1) What Area 92 information requirements and operating procedures could be adopted to improve the effectiveness of its “motion driven” business activities?
- 2) What Area 92 technology implementations would increase the accessibility of information to the fellowship’s program of recovery and its service activities?



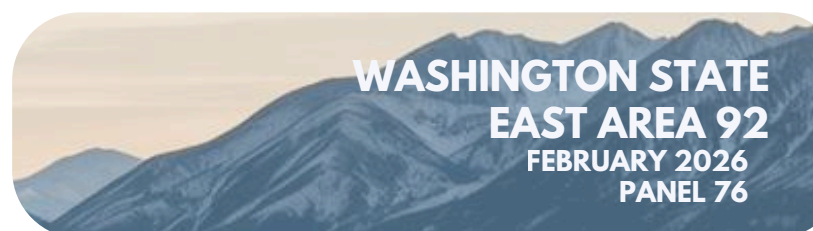

Our goal is to maintain a well-informed group conscience. I am making every effort to attend and remain present at all training workshops and DCM meetings via Zoom.

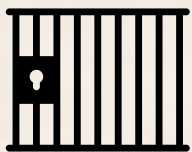

Keys to Corrections



A column to inform and encourage

Welcome to the first installment of what we hope to be a long running column of informative, encouraging, and inspirational topics from the wonderful world of service in AA Corrections. We welcome you to the...

Keys to Corrections!

Our lead off topic is a service that anyone in our Fellowship can step up and do. It is low hours, free, based on your own time schedule, highly rewarding, and a big impact to those in need. It is our General Service Office coordinated **Corrections Correspondence Service!** This program simply stated, is basically a type of “pen-pal” correspondence. Or maybe in today’s age, a “key-board” or smart phone “thumbs-action” activity!

The latest revision Corrections Handbook M-45I states that; *“The G.S.O. corrections desk receives approximately 80 letters a week from individuals in detention who wish to receive A.A. literature, A.A. contacts, temporary sponsorship, and correspondence with A.A.s on the outside... the Corrections Correspondence Service allows inside A.A.s to correspond with outside A.A.s on an individual bases.”*

Our A.A. Guidelines for Corrections Committees MG-06 informs that; *“The Corrections Correspondence Service (C.C.S.), coordinated through G.S.O., across the U.S. and Canada offers a rewarding opportunity for “A.A.s on the outside” to share experience, strength, and hope with incarcerated alcoholics from another region. Helpful guidelines are available to outsiders in form F-26.”*

Form F-26 goes on to say; *“Having prison experience is not a prerequisite – sobriety in A.A. is. People in custody are more interested in learning how we got and stayed sober through A.A.’s Twelve Steps, rather than hearing about time we may have spent in prison.”*

The C.C.S. program is detailed and outlined on this form, and on the other side is the actual “Correspondence Form” that the outside A.A. Member can fill out, mail to G.S.O., and be assigned an incarcerated inside A.A. Member to share Sobriety with.

Talk about being the **Hand of AA!!**
