Happy March my friends!

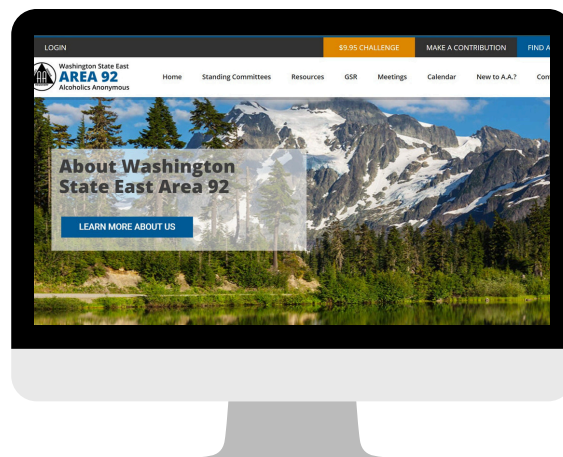

Let's get to it! Let's talk about what the Archives Committee does for you and what you can expect from the ASC.

The Archives Steering Committee supports the work of the Archives Committee and Archivist within Area 92. Its purpose is to help preserve, organize, and share the history of AA within the Area so that the experience and growth of the Fellowship are not lost over time.

Working alongside the Area Archivist and Archives Chair, the committee assists in collecting and preserving historical materials such as meeting minutes, flyers, event programs, photographs, recordings, and other documents that reflect the development of AA in the Area. Members may also help organize, catalog, and safely store materials so they remain accessible for future members. We always invite volunteers for this work!

The committee can also help guide archival planning and procedures, offering continuity and historical perspective. It may support special projects such as oral history interviews, historical timelines, and archives displays at Area assemblies, workshops, or conventions. These activities help make the archives visible and useful to members while encouraging groups and districts to preserve their own histories.

Another important role of the steering committee is education. Through presentations and workshops, members help carry the message that preserving AA history strengthens the Fellowship's understanding of its roots and growth.

Guided by service materials from the General Service Office of Alcoholics Anonymous, the committee helps ensure the story of AA in Area 92 is preserved for future generations.

Communication Breakdown: Are Groups Tuning Out?

Are our groups actually hearing from their service bodies, or have they started **tuning us out**? In our efforts to handle the business of Alcoholics Anonymous, I try to keep the spirituality of this program at the forefront. We rely on a fragile, vital thing: **an informed group conscience**.

Sharing informed opinions is like a Fifth Step; honest vulnerability allows the God of my understanding to participate in the discussion. When I keep that in mind, I can find peace even when a vote doesn't go my way.

The Danger of Being Uninformed

I must be honest: I haven't always taken the time to be informed. Often, being uninformed hasn't stopped me from loudly expressing my opinion. When I act this way, I'm not looking for solutions; I'm looking for hostages to agree with my resentments.

As alcoholics, we are **masters of rationalization**. We turn anger into "passion" and use it to justify attacking those who disagree. This breakdown fuels the rumor mill—claims that AA is "going woke," removing God, or "falling apart." This chaos and fear are caused when we don't make the effort to stay truly informed.

My Journey in Service

My attempts to "make amends" in service have evolved:

- First Attempt: I passed information along but didn't read it, claiming I "trusted the process" until a decision went against my liking.
- Second Attempt: I read everything but became a martyr, resenting others who didn't work as hard as I did.
- Current Practice: Today, **I get informed**. But I don't just dump raw data on groups—that causes them to tune out. Instead, I provide context. I explain why the information matters to the alcoholic who still suffers.

Moving Forward Together

I am a work in progress, supported by an incredible fellowship in Area 92. From our technology servants opening digital doors to our standing committees taking action, we are working to stay connected.

I owe my life, family, and sanity to Alcoholics Anonymous. I grew up in both a drinking and a sober home; I know the difference this program makes. We do this service work and strive for better communication because of one absolute truth: **No one deserves to die of this disease**.

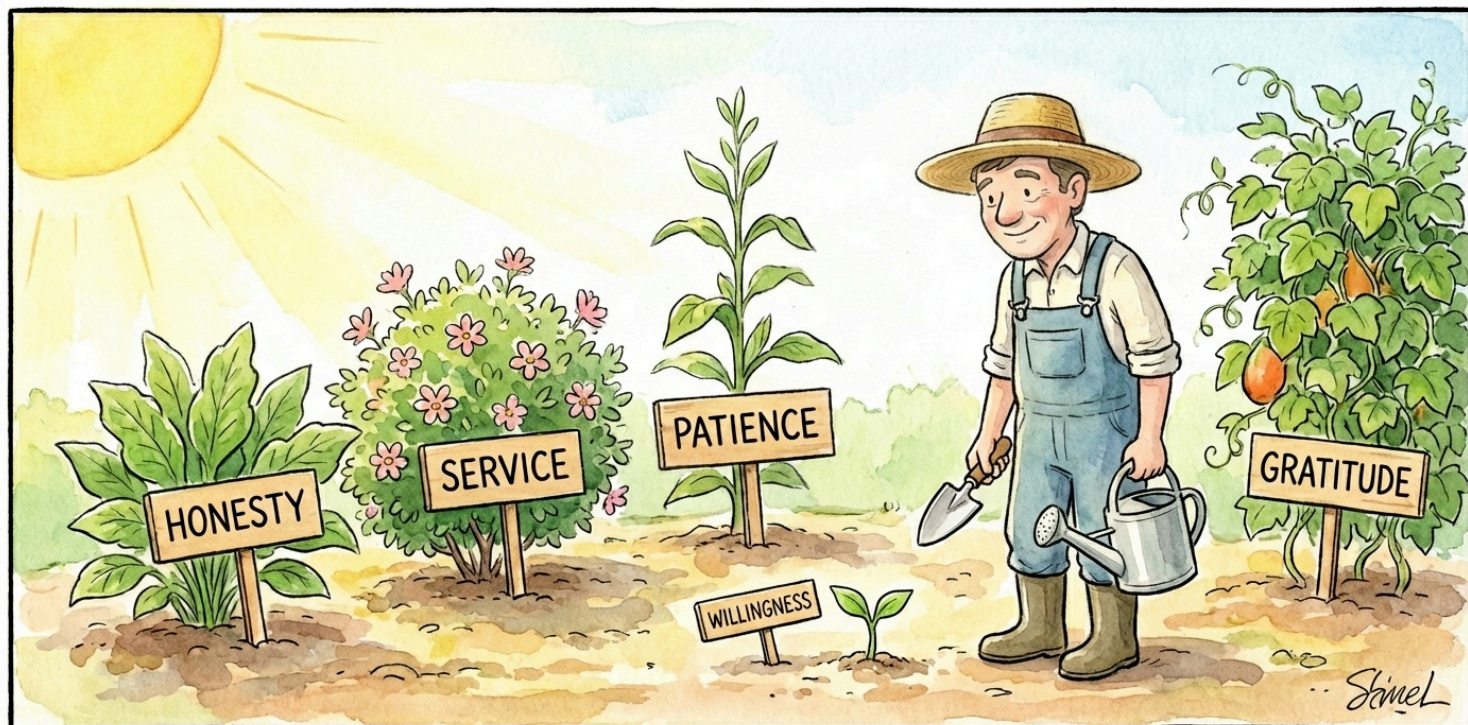

November 13th 2025, Coyote Ridge Corrections Center (CRCC) members of the recovery community held our 2nd annual Recovery Day Celebration which included representatives of Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, and Al-Anon.

The event featured inside and outside speakers from all three recovery groups. The event was organized well, and came off without a hitch! That is no small feat, because unexpected delays and mini-emergencies are the rule rather than the exception around here.


But this time we were lucky and all were treated to a great afternoon with family and friends invited. Events like these help draw new people to our groups, who might not ever get the message any other way. When those new people show up to meetings and start to return and work the program, and we see the Light come on, it's a beautiful thing.

There is a heavy need for this type of recovery attraction, because also like on the street; people in here are dying as well. Unfortunately, three men have met their end this year alone.

When we talk about "the recovery community" here at CRCC we are talking about a small, but growing group of guys who are drop dead serious about recovery.

Keys to Corrections



A Column to Inform and Encourage

Welcome to our second installment of what we hope to be a long running column of informative, encouraging, and inspirational topics from the wonderful world of service in AA Corrections. We welcome you to the... **Keys to Corrections!**

Our headlining topic this month is what's often referred to as our **"Bridge"** program. This will be the first of two installments on this life changing program. The two-part series is halved at an inherent line between the inside AA Member, and the outside AA Member. And trust me, it is a life changing program for both parties. Our first focus will be on our inside Member, our Fellows behind the bars.

Our M45i Corrections Workbook introduces this program with a straight forward mission statement outlining the heart of the program, it states:

"Past experience has shown that attending an A.A. meeting on the outside on the day of release from prison is one of the most effective tools in making a sober transition and maintaining continued sobriety in the free world. It is strongly recommended that anyone in custody who is an A.A. member have an A.A. contact on the outside (preferably with at least one year's sobriety and of the same sex) who contacts and arranges to meet him or her on the day of release to help in "Bridging the Gap" between the institution and A.A. on the outside.

This section of the workbook deals with guidelines for A.A. members who want to participate in this type of service, sometimes referred to as "Prerelease" programs and sometimes as "Bridging the Gap" programs."

As you can see here even in our Workbook this program has an ambiguous name. This is due mainly in part to the Corrections Committee being a part of AA's original *"Hospitals and Institutions"* Committee or "H&I". Several years ago, this all changed:

"In 1977, the General Service Conference recommended that the Institutions Committee be dissolved and two new committees—one dealing with Corrections, and one with Treatment Facilities—be formed. The 1983 General Service Conference recommended that a Corrections Workbook be developed for carrying the A.A. message into correctional facilities."

Historically in the H&I days the efforts to get folks to an AA meeting as soon as possible from release of any form of institution was referred to as: "Bridging the Gap". After the spit up of H&I it was attempted to have these similar programs referred to as "Bridging the Gap" for treatment facility release, and "Bridge" for correctional facility release. This has been a source of confusion ever since. But our literature and brochures have tried to maintain their distinction. In recent times efforts have been enacted in what I see as an attempt to separate their names even further. By embracing terminology more in line with governing bodies of the institutions, we now have the referred to term of "Prerelease". Currently there is even discussion of embracing a newer terminology of "Reentry". Has there ever been a place where our Tradition 9's claim that "A.A., as such, ought never be organized..." has ever been more applicable??!! Rest assured, the heart and passion of our efforts at the mission of these programs is little hampered by such nuances, but when in conversation, let it be a heads up that you may hear its reference by different names, but the inference is understood. Currently our M45i Workbook, F-163, and F-162 forms/brochures are titled as "Prerelease" programs. Personally, I try hard to at least be consistent with the term "Bridge", somehow it has an essence of warmth to it for me.

What does the inside AA Member do? How do they begin their journey over this "Bridge"? Well, it actually starts with the outside AA Members. We provide the Form F-163 for the member to fill out. We do this in several ways; brought in with a meeting, provided with other literature, inform facilities where to download, or mailed in by an outside person. These are some of the standard ways. There are some critical

points mentioned in this form that ensure the greatest success in this program. One, the inside member must give us some time, thus it suggests that they complete and mail the form in six months prior to release. This gives snail mail time to reach us, secure a volunteer to contact them and arrange to meet and “bridge” the releasing AA. Today, our practice has changed a bit. Once we receive an **F-163** form this rotation of your Corrections Committee has been able to embrace new technology. We simply get on the app of communication used with the inside members DOC provided tablet (Securus) and email them. Thus, immediate contact and dialogue is established. This has worked great for our Washington prisons. Jails though, do not have these tablets, and we have had no success yet this way with Idaho facilities either, so snail mail is still used for these and are our only means.

Now, I ask that you take a minute and place yourself in this position; You have been incarcerated for say fifteen years, and for the last ten years of that, you have found sobriety and attended AA meetings provided by outside members coming in. They bring experience, strength, hope, the Big Book, literature, and other materials. Among them you have occasionally heard about this “Bridge” program and some form to fill out. You see it occasionally floating around the facility. Maybe there is one that is all tattered and has nearly as much time there as you have. One day, about six months to your being released you find this form. You fill it out. You get to the end of the form and,,, there is a blank spot where you are to address and send it!

What do you do??! Maybe you can find out from one of the outside members coming in, although dialogue is structured and maybe restricted. And they are not allowed to take material back out with them. Maybe you can send a letter to GSO. Already, this “Bridge” seems rocky and uncertain. But maybe you’re lucky, and it seems firmer, for there is already a mailing address in this blank space. Thank you responsible hand of AA! You mail the form and eagerly await a reply. You wait, and you wait, and you wait. And your day of release draws nearer.

Trepidatious isn’t it. If you take a look at the links and the **F-163** forms they go to below, you will see that the form that is available for download from our website has our Corrections P.O. Box address already there. If you go to AA.org and download this form, it will be a blank space. When, as District 2’s Corrections Chair, I went to supply Airway Heights Correction Center with some of these forms, I discovered this. I asked the GSR for their Landing Place Group if any of these forms were inside the facility already. I was provided with two blank forms mailed out to me. One form was actually an **F-183**, *Bridging the Gap* form. And the other a **F-163** Bridge form which was an edition from 2016 or so, but it did have our P.O. Box address. In fact, and this is important, it was the same address we currently use. How is this you may wonder. This is because it is evidence of your 7th Tradition and Area 92 at work. It is the effort of your trusted servants and the couple of bucks you put in the hat, your Groups which participate in the service structure and do regular and consistent dispersants/splits of your choosing; Districts, GSO, Intergroups/CSO’s. And in this case, your Area 92. I discovered that this P.O. Box had records of establishment at least as far back as 17 Oct 2014, and that the bill had consistently been paid. Thank all of you currently, and all that came before me. What a God send.

I will leave you all here, having filled out your **F-163** form, mailing it in, and now waiting...

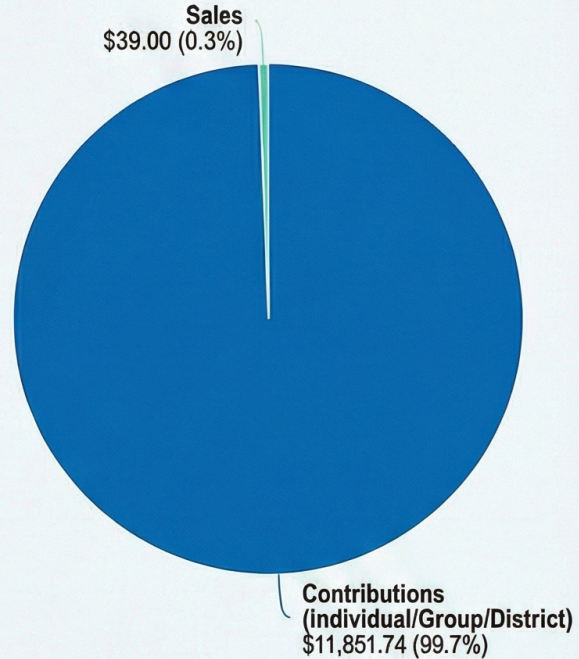

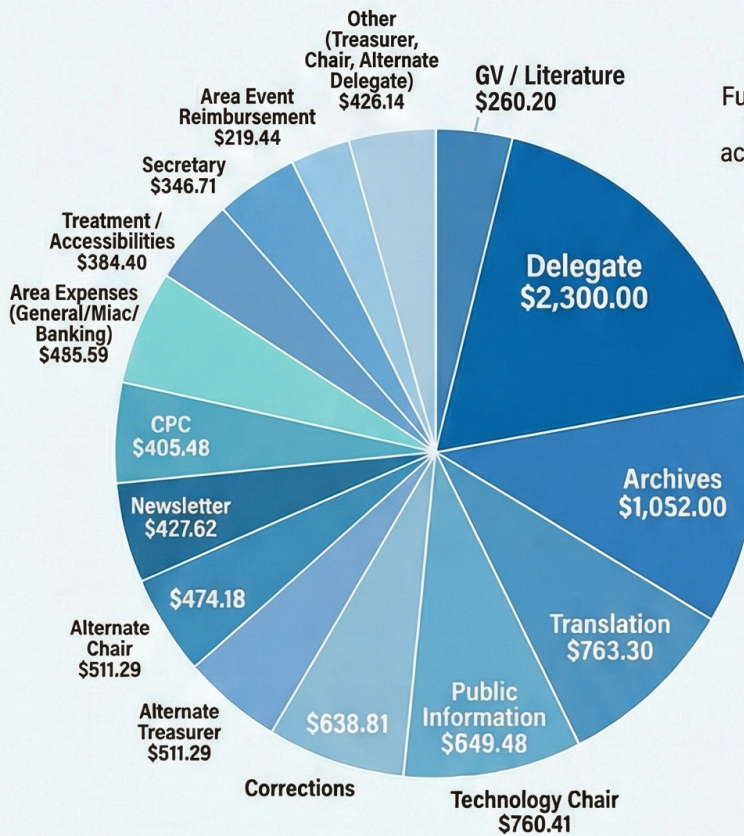
