Don't forget about the **online agenda item discussion April 8th.**

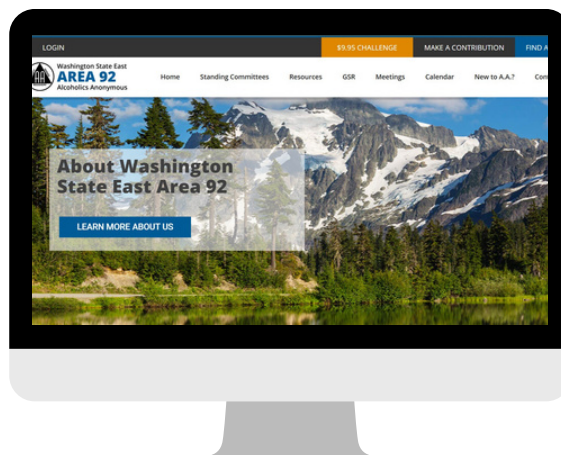
I am looking forward to seeing everyone in Selah for the April Pre-Conference Assembly. I am looking forward to hearing what you and your groups have to say about the agenda items.

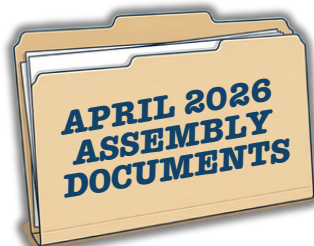

ARCHIVES

Hello!

Originally, all of Washington State was part of a single A.A. delegate Area within the General Service Conference structure. Handling all districts across Washington, from coastal regions to inland communities. As A.A. grew (especially post-1960s), the number of groups, districts, and service demands increased significantly. In 1995, after several years of discussion, Washington State's A.A. service structure underwent an important and thoughtful change. What had once been a single delegate area was divided into two: Area 72 (Western Washington) and Area 92 (Eastern Washington and surrounding regions).

This decision was not born of disagreement, but of growth. As A.A. expanded across the state, the increasing number of groups, districts, and service needs made it difficult for one delegate and a single area structure to effectively serve the entire region. Travel distances, geographic barriers, and the diversity of local group needs all contributed to the challenge.

Through discussion, inventory, and group conscience, the fellowship chose to reorganize in order to better serve alcoholics and support participation in General Service. The division allowed for more accessible assemblies, stronger communication, and better representation of local voices.

The transition itself reflected A.A.'s principles: assets were shared, committees formed, and unity maintained throughout the process.

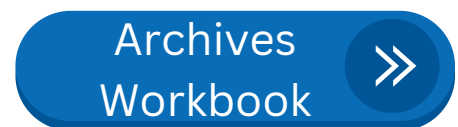

NEWSLETTER

Happy April and thank you to D22 and Kim O. for a wonderful Agenda Review Workshop!

We have added 15 new subscribers this month taking our total to over 300.

Here is a question that I am getting...Why 250 words maximum for the newsletter reports. First and foremost, it is the policy of the newsletter. But more importantly, why?

Research consistently shows that shorter content performs better because readers tend to scan rather than read in full. Eye-tracking studies by the Nielsen Norman Group demonstrate an "F-pattern" scanning behavior, where users focus on headlines and opening lines, meaning a message around 250 words is more likely to be fully absorbed before attention drops. This aligns with Microsoft's research on attention spans and Cognitive Load Theory, which shows that the more information presented at once, the less readers retain - making concise writing more memorable. Finally, a 250-word limit forces the author to prioritize the "Must-Know" over the "Nice-to-Know," leading to better memory retention for the reader.

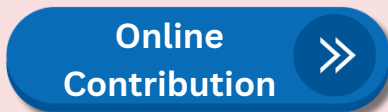

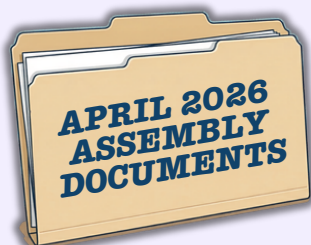
We labeled it April 2026Assembly

As trusted servants - whether GSRs, DCMs, alternates, current and past delegates, officers, or committee chairs - we all share the **Right of Participation**. We exercise that right when we come to the microphone on the floor to share a message. Our words address the matters before this body as we work to reach a group conscience.

Everyone who speaks shares their thoughts on these issues as a member of this body and as a member of AA. Every discussion we engage in has a direct bearing on our ability to achieve that group conscience.

Each one of us is a fundamental part of this process. We must hear everything that is shared to make a true group conscience possible. As we discuss the motions and the agenda this weekend, we do a mighty thing: we make the decisions of this body and empower our Delegate to carry our group conscience to the Conference.

Many of us will come to the microphone to share the thoughts of our groups, districts, or committees. Others will share personal experience or individual perspectives. This is exactly as it should be; therefore, let us remember **Prudence**.

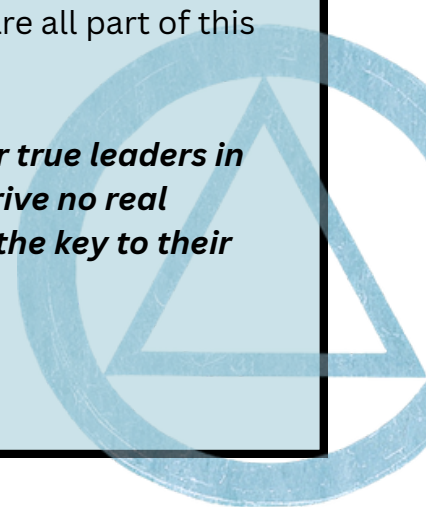
Prudence does not apply only to the financial matters of our fellowship. It applies to our thinking, our speaking, and our vision of the matters at hand. As defined in **Concept XII** of the Service Manual, Prudence "in practice creates a definite climate - the only climate in which harmony, effectiveness, and consistent spiritual progress can be achieved."

So, let us use Prudence. Much of what we discuss stirs passionate emotions and strong convictions. We care - and we must. But we must also reach a group conscience, so let us employ Prudence in our dialogue today.

We should listen to the message for the sake of the message itself, rather than focusing on who is delivering it. If we weigh a message by the person giving it rather than its content, we do ourselves a disservice. We are all alcoholics, and we are all part of this work together. **Tradition Two** reminds us:

"All such representatives are to be guided in the spirit of service, for true leaders in AA are but trusted and experienced servants of the whole. They derive no real authority from their titles; they do not govern. Universal respect is the key to their usefulness."

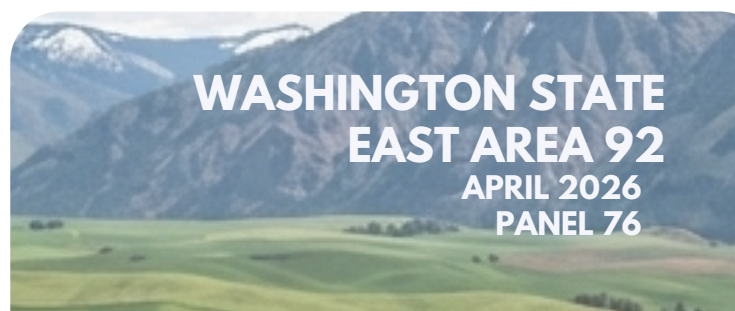

We will finish up discussion on the motion for the Archives and the following week is the Pre Conference Assembly in Selah!! Can't wait!! Hope to see you all there!


Our Committee Chair Carole N. is doing an amazing job putting together the Quarterly in July. We will have flyers out soon.

There are a few birthdays to note in the district for the Month of April:

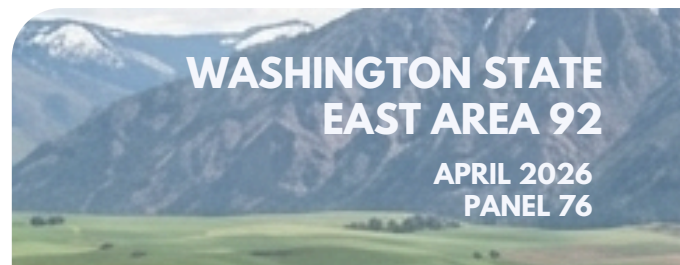


Good day Area 92. Greetings from District 25!

Keys to Corrections



A Column to Inform and Encourage

Welcome to our third installment of what we hope to be a long running column of informative, encouraging, and inspirational topics from the wonderful world of service in AA Corrections. We welcome you to the... **Keys to Corrections!**

Our headlining topic this month is what's often referred to as our "**Bridge**" program. This is the second of two installments on this life changing program. The two-part series is halved at an inherent line between the inside AA Member, and the outside AA Member. And trust me, it is a life changing program for both parties. Our focus for this issue will be on our outside Member, our Fellows in the meeting rooms, business meetings, potlucks, campouts, dances, Assemblies, workshops,, activities all around our Area 92.

Let us review a couple of very key points mentioned in our first half, some important items to remember and understand when discussing our AA "**Bridge**" program...

Our M45i Corrections Workbook introduces this program with a straight forward mission statement outlining the heart of the program, it states:

"Past experience has shown that attending an A.A. meeting on the outside on the day of release from prison is one of the most effective tools in making a sober transition and maintaining continued sobriety in the free world. It is strongly recommended that anyone in custody who is an A.A. member have an A.A. contact on the outside (preferably with at least one year's sobriety and of the same sex) who contacts and arranges to meet him or her on the day of release to help in "Bridging the Gap" between the institution and A.A. on the outside.

This section of the workbook deals with guidelines for A.A. members who want to participate in this type of service, sometimes referred to as "Prerelease" programs and sometimes as "Bridging the Gap" programs."

As you can see here even in our Workbook this program has an ambiguous name. This is due mainly in part to the Corrections Committee being a part of AA's original "*Hospitals and Institutions*" Committee or "H&I". Several years ago, this all changed:

"In 1977, the General Service Conference recommended that the Institutions Committee be dissolved and two new committees—one dealing with Corrections, and one with Treatment Facilities—be formed. The 1983 General Service Conference recommended that a Corrections Workbook be developed for carrying the A.A. message into correctional facilities."

Historically in the H&I days the efforts to get folks to an AA meeting as soon as possible from release of any form of institution was referred to as: "Bridging the Gap". After the spit up of H&I it was attempted to have these similar programs referred to as "Bridging the Gap" for treatment facility release, and "Bridge" for correctional facility release. This has been a source of confusion ever since. But our literature and brochures have tried to maintain their distinction. In recent times efforts have been enacted in what I see as an attempt to separate their names even further. By embracing terminology more in line with governing bodies of the institutions, we now have the referred to term of "Prerelease". Currently there is even discussion of embracing a newer terminology of "Reentry". Has there ever been a place where our Tradition 9's claim that "A.A., as such, ought never be organized..." has ever been more applicable??!! Rest assured, the heart and passion of our efforts at the mission of these programs is little hampered by such nuances, but when in conversation, let it be a heads up that you may hear its reference by different names, but the inference is understood. Currently our M45i Workbook, F-163, and F-162 forms/brochures are titled as "Prerelease" programs. Personally, I try hard to at least be consistent with the term "Bridge", somehow it has an essence of warmth to it for me.

A Column to Inform and Encourage

Do you remember in our first half where we left the inside AA Member; *"... You wait, and you wait, and you wait. And your day of release draws nearer."*

What is it that the inside AA Member is waiting for? CONTACT!! Today we have technology on our side. It used to take weeks for a hand written letter to reach the inside AA Member, then for them to write back, then for the two parties to establish a plan to actually meet up and get to that first AA meeting. Now we are receiving the inside AA Members F-163 request form at the mail box and sometimes have literally been able to be in direct contact with them within minutes. We simply send them an email. What kind of impact does this have? Let me share some of the responses I have received.

"I appreciate what you guys do I am still involved with my recovery!"

"Thank you. I am surprised by your email and not an actual letter (paper). But this is cool too!"

"Wow, really appreciate hearing from you. I was doing a 5th step, but I changed locations and lost contact with my group."

"God working in my life, I sincerely appreciate you reaching out to me it means a lot I am coming up on 16 months clean!"

"Thank you, sir, for reaching out to me! I cannot give you a definite answer right now about my address because I am waiting to see the parole board. I Hope to hear back from you in regard to this letter. God, bless you have a good night."

So, how does one become a Bridge Volunteer. One can simply contact the Corrections Committee via email: corrections@area92aa.org . Sometimes you may come across a meeting that is circulating a volunteer sign-up form that gets sent to the Bridge Volunteer Coordinator, or you may come across the F-162 Form for the Outside AA Member. Hopefully it will have the Area's Corrections mailing address in the listed box for you to mail the completed form back to. Remember, if you go to area92aa.org/wp-content/uploads/2024/05/f-162_en_0223.pdf you can print forms that have that address already on them.

What exactly does a Bridge Volunteer do? The F-162 form describes the role well. The process described goes pretty much like this; make contact (mail or email), keep in correspondence until they are released, make arrangements to get to that first meeting as soon as possible (within 24-48hrs is recommended), like any 12 Step call grab a buddy and get the new Member to a good 12 Step based meeting, introduce them, get them some phone numbers, talk about a Home Group, get them looking for a Sponsor, help them get some literature, suggest as many meetings as possible until these things are accomplished. The F-162 form suggests at this point; *"Your job is finished after a sponsor has been found, or when you and the newly released member feel that the member is secure enough for you to move on."*

There are of course things Volunteers are suggested not to do, like; don't go alone for that first in-person contact, don't open your home or lend money, don't use your address for correspondence but use the Area Corrections address instead. Your Volunteer Coordinator will offer a brief orientation to get you started.

It is a rewarding experience to be sitting in a meeting hearing a Member share how they just got their driver's license and drove their own car to the meeting. A Member who but a year ago you had a hand in helping across a Bridge that spans a deep chasm of fear and uncertainty from a contained community behind the walls to a loving AA Fellowship with a design for living free. Join us.
