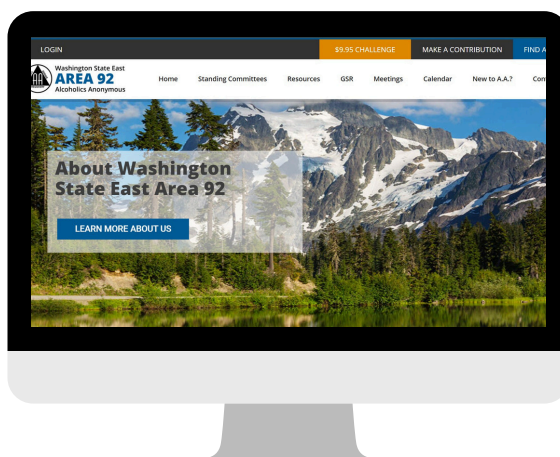
I am looking for volunteers to help me revamp the GSR School. If you are interested or know of someone that would like to help, please contact me.

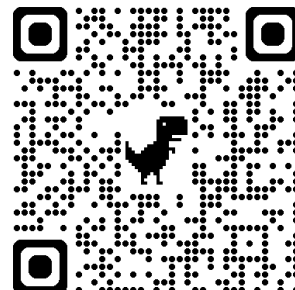

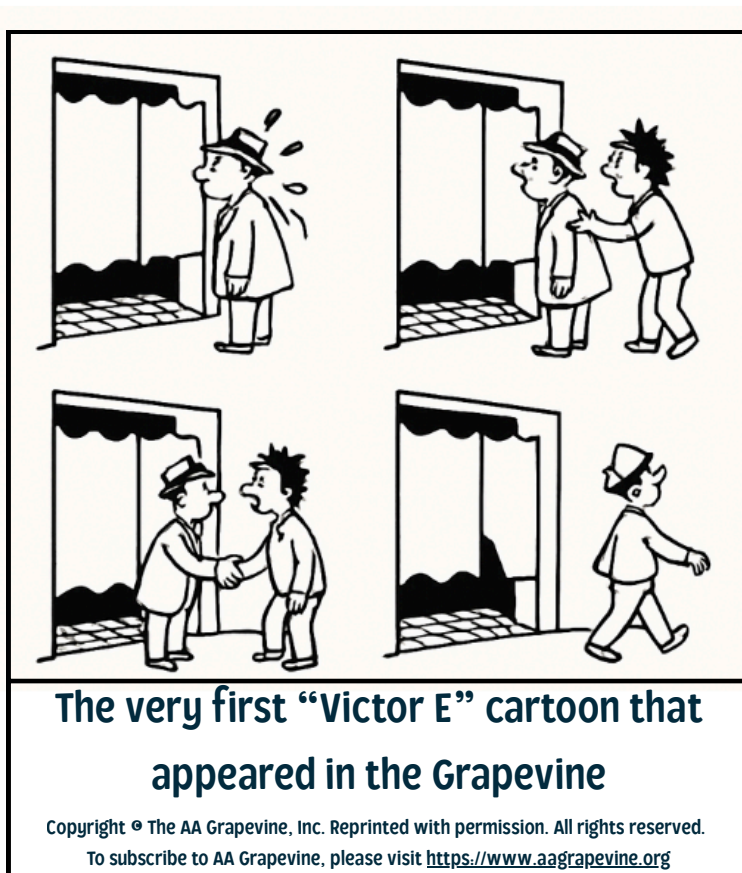

# THE POWER OF THE PURSE

Given to the General Service Conference **Finance Committee**

In recent discussions, I've heard it suggested that the drop in our 7th Tradition contributions is due to the "power of the purse" - meaning members are intentionally withholding funds.

In a way, I actually hope that is the case. Why? Because if it's a matter of trust or communication, that is something we can take direct action to address and heal.

However, at the risk of brushing against outside issues, we have to acknowledge that broader economic, political, and social factors do impact us. Think back to the COVID outbreak—or as I like to call it, the Great American Toilet Paper Shortage—and how deeply that affected our coffers. My real concern is that the current economic climate in North America and around the world is squeezing our fellowship much harder than any distrust of our trusted servants or disagreements with GSC actions.

My Area is already facing these economic realities head-on and taking action to tighten our belts. Some of our districts and groups are even having the tough conversation about whether coffee is a strict necessity.

At the same time, our Area Technology Committee is stepping up to provide cost-effective digital communication tools. They are training our DCMs and Alternate DCMs on these platforms, which builds familiarity and common skills across the board. That adoption by our trusted servants is the absolute key to our success—because a lack of adoption can kill even the best solutions.

Ultimately, I believe the most effective ways to save money—while still conducting the business of A.A. and carrying the message—will bubble up directly from the fellowship. Areas, Districts, and Groups are already actively sharing what works and what doesn't. I strongly encourage this continued sharing at the grassroots level, and it is my sincere hope that the GSO is listening to these solutions and sharing them just as widely.

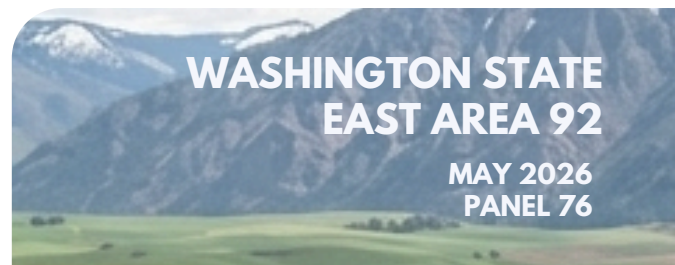



# Keys to Corrections



A Column to Inform and Encourage

Welcome to our fourth installment of what we hope to be a long running column of informative, encouraging, and inspirational topics from the wonderful world of service in AA Corrections. We welcome you to the... **Keys to Corrections!**

This month we are going to take a look at long standing, yet controversial program called; **"The Pink Can"**. This fund-raising initiative as stated in the 2006 fall edition of GSO's Box 459, was started back in 1957. Here is a little of what this Box 459 article "Pink Cans: Small Change Brings Big Results" shares.

*"The Northern California Area Hospitals and Institutions committee (H&I) was rapidly expanding its work in prisons, and the need for literature was increasing by leaps and bounds, to the point where it could no longer be met by individual contributions. Someone came up with the idea of passing around a can at group meetings, explaining that the pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters dropped into the can were intended for alcoholics in prisons and hospitals. How to make the cans stand out? Paint them pink!"*

So, great idea, right?! What could make this so controversial? The article goes on to say...

*"In the beginning, some members were afraid that donations to the pink cans would decrease group contributions, and mindful of that possibility, the committee has always emphasized the importance of providing clear information. They send each group a flyer explaining what the cans are for, print information in local A.A. newsletters, and always suggest that the secretary emphasize the importance of contributions to group expenses first."*

Recently a flyer, believed to be from the 90's, was found in the Pioneer Group meetings literature materials in Walla Walla's Washington State Penitentiary. Founded in 1942 this is the oldest continuous running corrections meeting behind bars in the world. The flyer is titled; *"Washington Area East 12<sup>th</sup> Step Literature: What are those PINK CANS for?"* Within this full-page narrative flyer, reads the following paragraph.

*"One of the fears expressed of the PINK CAN was that they would subtract from the support of the meetings. This was dispelled by groups that determined their meeting donations were the same with or without the PINK CAN."*

Have fears been "dispelled"? I suppose that could be subjectable, but let's consider some apparent evidence of acceptance by our bodies of Trusted Servants. One, the previously quoted 2006 Box 459 article. Box 459 is GSO's newsletter to our Fellowship. Two, AAWS's Corrections Workbook (M-45I) has no less than three full pages giving several examples of Pink Can or pink can type programs used by Groups, Districts, and Areas across the country. Of all these, only one makes mention of a "budgeted" literature allocation type structure. This is what it says in our Corrections Workbook.

*"In Kansas, it is reported that they have a yearly sum of approximately \$1000 that is allocated for literature. Although this is the biggest item in their budget, it is still a meager sum, and a short while ago they started placing contribution cans at their meetings. As they tell all their members, even the smallest contribution helps."*

Fears dispelled or not, it certainly seems that after more than sixty years in existence, the effectiveness of the Pink Can has proved itself, and it's recorded history in our archives and submission into our Fellowship

approved publications, would certainly reflect at least an embrace if not a full nod of approval. One thing for certain, AA literature behind the walls is one of the highest calls to duty for our basic lifesaving materials.

The Workbooks funding suggestions section, *“Shared Experience on How Committees Collect Contributions for Literature”* states.

*“Alcoholics confined in correctional facilities usually have just one A.A. meeting a week available to them, if they are lucky. A sizable number are on wait a list and go to none at all. But there’s another way to carry the message to these people: Provide them with meetings in print through and additional AAWS literature, pamphlets and the Grapevine. The only stumbling block is money.”*

*“How are local corrections committees funded? How do they accumulate literature for inside meetings? These questions have become a frequent refrain at all levels of service, including the General Service Office, where **more than 90 percent of the letters that cross the Corrections Desk contain requests for free literature.** In the spirit of AA’s Seventh Tradition, the search is on for financing approaches that make practical as well as spiritual sense.”*

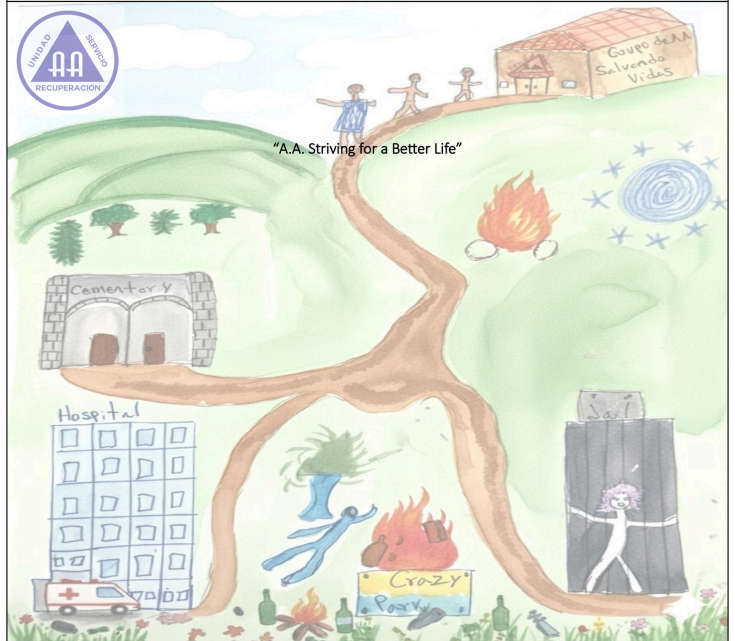

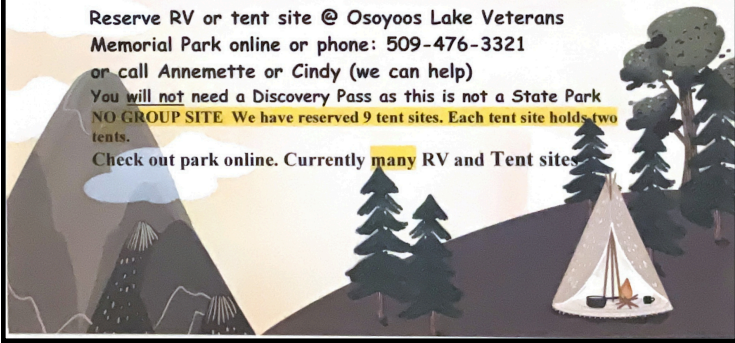

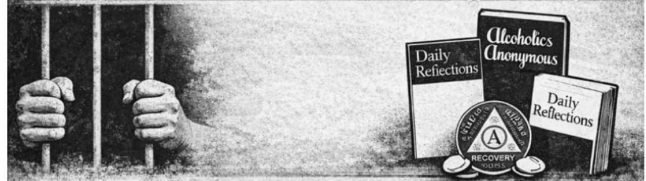
